Know name and locate the main rivers in the UK. Know the names of four countries from the southern and four from the northern hemisphere. Know where the equator, Tropic of Capricorn and the Greenwich Meridian are on a World map. Know what is meant by the term 'tropics'. 	- Know at least five differences between living in the UK and a Mediterranean country.	 Know and label the main features of a river. Know the name of and locate a number of the world's longest rivers. Know the names of a number of the world's highest mountains. Explain the features of a water cycle. Know the formation of rivers, meanders and oxbow lakes. Know why most cities are located by a river. Label layers of a rainforest and know what deforestation is. 	 Use maps to locate European countries and capitals. Use maps and globes to locate the equator, Tropic of Cancer, Tropic of Capricorn and the Greenwich Meridian. Know and name the eight points of a compass. Know how to plan a journey within the UK, using a road map. Know what Ordnance Survey symbols stand for.
